Innovations can play a major role in providing affordable and quality healthcare services and education to the population. According to the World Health Organization, 'health innovation' improves the effectiveness, productivity, quality, sustainability, safety and affordability of healthcare. Adoption of innovations is increasingly becoming the norm across the healthcare and education sectors as acceleration of innovations can bring enormous opportunities and can change the healthcare and education sectors in meaningful ways including improved policies, systems, effective services, practices, products, delivery methods through which people can get good quality of services at affordable cost. Actors and key stakeholders of the healthcare and education sectors, that is, healthcare professionals, policymakers, development partners, academicians, industry experts, and clinical and non-clinical professionals have plenty of opportunities to explore the available scope and avenues by implementing innovative interventions in their respective sectors. Plethora of problems and challenges have been resolved by entrepreneurs working towards the development of effective innovative solutions and technologies for pressing needs.

Academic institutions can collaborate with other stakeholders to develop information, resulting in knowledge co-production or co-creation, which can boost the social effect of research by forming dynamic, locally tailored partnerships, sharing power, and resolving continuing disagreements. They can participate in reciprocal rotations, secondments, policy fellowships and internships with the government and community to foster experiential learning and research initiatives.

Abstract

The study is designed for sustainable healthcare system with providers' initiatives to provide quality services in healthcare organisations. Healthcare providers' initiatives promote quality and ensure better healthcare services. Among the healthcare providers who were studied and reviewed, it was observed that the initiatives of the healthcare providers improved the overall quality. There is a distinct scope of further enhancement with the participation of healthcare providers in healthcare organisations. The purpose of this research is to learn and determine the answers to questions through scientific application. This study shows that an augmented frequency of sustainable healthcare systems is only possible through the initiatives of healthcare providers. Abstract---Aim: The purpose of the present research was to evaluate various modalities for treating hypomineralized primary teeth. Methodology: Survival data retrospectively collected from 52 children with MIH, monitored. We evaluated one hundred and twenty unknown, high-quality photographs from occlusal and smooth surfaces, respectively, for the detection of cavitated carious lesions and caries-associated restorations (DMF index) and MIH. Descriptive and explorative analyses were performed, including Kaplan-Meier estimators. Results: The mean patient observation time was 42.9
