### Introduction

# **The University**

The IIHMR University has been established and incorporated as a post graduate research University by Government of Rajasthan vide the IIHMR University Ordinance, 2013 (Ordinance No 30 of 2013) promulgated on September 27, 2013 by the Governor which was replaced by the IIHMR University Act, 2014 (Act No. 3, of 2014) passed by the State Legislature on February 07, 2014. The Act of 2014 received the assent of the Governor on 25th day of February 2014 and was notified in Rajasthan Gazette Extraordinary on February 26, 2014. It has deemed to have come in to force on and from September 27, 2013.

# Origin

The genesis of the IIHMR University dates back to October 5, 1984 when its sponsoring body, the Indian Institute of Health Management Research (IIHMR) was established and registered as a non-profit Society under the Rajasthan Societies Registration Act, 1958. The Institute was established with a mission of improvement in standards of health through improved management of health care and related programmes through management research, education, training, consultation and institutional networking in a national and global perspective. IIHMR successfully created and established a new discipline of health management in the country, and over last 34 years IIHMR has established itself as a unique research, education and training organization in India and South- East Asian Region. After having pursued the cause of management research, academics and capacity building exclusively in the health sector for about three decades, the institute submitted a proposal before the State Government in accordance with the guidelines for the establishment of private universities by separate Act. The proposal of the university was accepted by the government.

# **Objectives**

As defined in Section 4 of the IIHMR University Act, 2014, the objective of the University shall be to undertake only post graduate education and research in the disciplines specified in Schedule II and such other disciplines as the University may with prior approval of the State Government, determine from time to time and to achieve excellence and impart and disseminate knowledge in the said disciplines. The mandated disciplines which have been mentioned in Schedule II of the Act are as under:

#### **Endowment Fund**

The University has deposited rupees two crores in the public deposit account with the State Government on September 11, 2013 in accordance with Section 8 of the IIHMR University, Jaipur Ordinance, 2013. This endowment fund will be used as security deposit to ensure that the University complies and functions with the provisions of the Act. The income from the Endowment Fund may be utilized for development of infrastructure of the University.

### **Collaborations**

The University has been instrumental in setting up collaborations and networking globally with various national and international organizations to promote postgraduate education, research and capacity building in the mandated disciplines. The University takes pride in having collaborative partnership with the following prestigious institutions and organizations:



Johns Hopkins University, Bloomberg School of Public Health and IIHMR University signed a Memorandum of Understanding in the area of research, education and training. The idea behind was to provide a focus on public health capacity building in developing countries; cultivating students health management skills thereby enhancing the effectiveness and efficiency of public health programmes and services; and preparing professionals for exciting careers in public health management in the public and private sectors, non-governmental organizations (NGOs) and national and multinational organizations.



IIHMR University and the University of Chester, U.K. have signed Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) to enhance academic and research opportunities for the staff and students and also to develop cultural linkages between both the Universities in the field of public health.



The Curtin University, Perth, Australia entered into a Memorandum of Understanding with IIHMR University on August 31, 2016 for a period of five years. The MoU focusses on developments in learning and teaching quality, improving learning environments and opportunities for students, developing and sharing publications of common interest, organizing seminars and conferences, research collaborations and student exchange.



The IIHMR University and The Université de Montréal, Montreal, Canada have entered a MoU on September 21, 2016 for a period of 5 years. The agreement of cooperation, inter alia, includes exchange of faculty members, research scholars and students at all levels, joint research projects and joint mentoring programs, organizing workshops, symposiums and conferences.



The IIHMR University signed a cooperative agreement with KhesarGyalpo University of Medical Sciences, Bhutan on November 11, 2016 for a period of 5 years. The agreement was to specifically focus on exchange of faculty and staff; exchange of students and publications; academic materials and information on joint research activities and scholarship programs; develop and conduct joint academic programs, research grants; human resource development; developing collaborative external funding proposals; and other developmental activities directed towards strengthening health systems in Bhutan including academic programs.



South-East Asia Public Health Education Institution Network (SEAPHEIN) has been created by the WHO South-East Asia Regional Office to promote collaboration and sharing of information and knowledge among the member countries in the Region in pursuit of strengthening public health education and training. IIHMR University is a founding partner of the network and has signed agreements for collaboration with various institutions in SEAR countries to promote capacity building in public health, management and joint collaborative research.



To promote public health education in India, India Public Health Education Institution Network (IndiaPHEIN) has been developed and promoted under the stewardship of WHO-SEARO. The university hosts the Secretariat of IndiaPHEIN and plays a leading role in establishing the network to strengthen public health education in India.



The IIHMR University and National Institute of Health and Family Welfare (NIHFW) have agreed to promote cooperation in education, training and research. The areas of co-operation include joint training; research; visits by an exchange of scholars, teachers and other staff; exchange of students for long and short term programmes; exchange of research materials (reports, information, published papers etc.); and sharing of information through video conferencing.



The IIHMR University and the SAARC Tuberculosis and HIV/AIDS Centre (STAC) have technical tie-up for conducting trainings in the SAARC countries. The IIHMRUniversity has been instrumental in providing technical support to the STAC through organizing several trainings on Leadership & Strategic Management in SAARC region.



The IIHMR University has signed a Memorandum of Understanding with the National Accreditation Board for Hospitals (NABH) and Quality Council of India, New Delhi. By signing this MoU, both the organizations represent their commitment for improving quality of healthcare organizations in India and partnering countries in the areas of mutual interests and establish the basis of coordination and collaboration in the conduct of research and training and promote quality and accreditation programmes in the health sector.



The IIHMR University entered into an MoU with Bharat Rural Livelihoods Foundation (BRLF) on October 31, 2016 for a period of 3 years. The central themes of the cooperation areto create multi-location multi-thematic multi-partnered academic programs for scheduled tribes, de-notified tribes, nomadic tribes, and other marginal social groups, with a special focus on youth and women, with the aim of developing them as rural livelihood professionals.



The IIHMR University, Jaipur, India Kandahar University, Kandahar, Islamic Republic of Afghanistan and have entered into a collaboration to establish a formal understanding of cooperation and friendship which is intended to further enhance academic objectives and promote better understanding between the faculty and students of IIHRMU and KDRU. The areas of cooperation include exchange of faculty members, exchange of students, joint research activities, participation in seminars and academic meetings, exchange of academic materials and other information, conduct short and long-term academic programmes, and pursue efforts to generate funds for the mentioned activities. The collaboration came into existence from December 18, 2018, for a period of five years.



The IIHMR University and Malviya National Institute of Technology (MNIT) entered into a collaboration in the areas of Teaching, Research and Training in the domains of public health, health and hospital administration, pharmaceutical management and rural development. The collaboration came into effect from 8 February 2019, for a period of five years. This venture will specially focus on Student and faculty exchange, partnering and supporting each other through joint research initiatives/projects, offering joint courses/programs in areas of common interest, and other academic/professional activities such as organizing conferences/seminars.

### Governance

The University is governed in accordance with the provisions of IIHMR University Act, 2014, the Statutes made thereunder and the University Grants Commission Act, 1956.

#### Meetings of the Board of Management

#### The Statutes

The Statutes were prepared by the University and the Board of Management approved them in its second meeting dated July 28, 2014. The Statutes have been sent to the State Government for approval on July 31, 2014. The Joint Secretary, Higher Education Department, requested the University on September 03, 2014 to modify the Statutes as per the Corrections made at appropriate places. The University Modified the Statutes and submitted before the Joint Secretary on September 11, 2014. Thereafter, the joint Secretary again raised some queries on June 15, 2015, October 16, 2015 and December 08, 2015 respectively. All the relevant queries were replied instantly but still the Statutes are under consideration with the State Government.

#### The Academic Council

The Academic Council is the principal academic body of the University and subject to the provisions of the Act and the Statutes, Regulations and Ordinances, it co-ordinates and exercises general supervision over the academic policies of the University.

### **Core Activities**

#### RESEARCH

The IIHMR University is primarily a Research University. It has enabling ambience and adequate infrastructure for conducting high quality research. The University has been able to create conducive conditions to enquire into the burning research questions with transparency, trust, accountability and autonomy. During the year the following research projects are completed.

# **Completed Research Projects**

End-line evaluation of patient's study: Community based Diabetes Detection and Care

**Agency:** Human People to People India (HPPI)

Team : Sunita Nigam, Rajeev Baghel

The study was carried out in three blocks (Osian, Bhopalgarh and Luni) of Jodhpur district covering 102 families, with an objective:

- To study the lifestyle of the patients identified by HPPI.
- To know the health seeking practices of diabetic patients in terms of screening for diabetes.
- To understand the effect of support from community-based support groups (TRIO) on management of diabetes.
- To report percent improvement in glucose level after intervention and introduction of TRIO group.
- To document the success stories and good practices of TRIOs.

The study brought the facts that, NCD cell was finding it difficult in reaching the entire community, where HPPI and ASHAs with the help of Community Cadres and Diabetes Educators could reach the community and villages in creating awareness and sensitize towards this disease.

The introduction of TRIO has been very successful in controlling the blood glucose levels. It is also a fact, that around 600 of those diabetes patients who have been part of a TRIO have purchased their own glucometer. With this patient becomes interested in closely monitoring the blood sugar levels though own device, where one can easily get instant results. Purchasing one's own glucometer is also a result of TRIO efforts as many patients understand the necessity and the value of testing regularly.

# Data analysis and reporting on Sanitation, ICDS, Public Health & other Issue under Nadia District

Agency: Zila Parishad, Nadia Kolkata

Team : Debjani Barman

The Zilla Parishad, Nadia has conducted a census to identify the gap areas for further improvement in areas like public health, water, sanitation and hygiene (WASH) covering child, adolescents and mother. The Census collected household specific information on family size and its composition (by sex, age, disability status), primary occupation, health seeking behavior of pregnant women and her infants in the household in the last one year, information on mother and infant death if any, utilization of Anganwadi centers (AWC), sources of drinking water and sanitation practices followed in the family including their solid and liquid waste management habits.

This study used quantitative methods to explore the present maternal, newborn and child health & nutrition practices among the households of Nadia district. It is important to assess and identify the gap to have evidence informed strategies for further improvement of health care seeking behavior and nutritional practices among new born child, lactating mother and pregnant women along with WASH and waste management behavior of the households in general.

In terms of WASH, the district has achieved a lot including the status of first open defecation free district of West Bengal. Now it is high time to keep the status intact. Although in majority of households tube well remains the major sources of drinking water, point of concern is the 2.93 percent households who still access drinking water from open sources. Similarly, in terms of sanitary latrine majority are using single pit latrine, so this can be upgraded to double pit latrine and 4.20 percent unusable latrine need to be make useable. Solid and liquid waste management need to be addressed more as in more than 50 percent households there is no scientific waste disposal system. However, disposing child excreta showed a very good household behavior whereas in few blocks and municipalities it needs to be addressed rigorously. Adolescent health status represents positive picture with majority of blocks and municipalities having less than one percent of households with adolescent girls getting married and becoming pregnant before 18 years of age. However, effort should be made to sustain the status.

In terms of maternal health percentage of institutional delivery is one point below cent percent. But there also two blocks-Nabadwip and Santipar lagged far behind the district average. These regions need to be taken care of on priority basis where effort should continue to keep the other regions at its present status. In terms of Nischayjan facility while the district coverage is at 82.88 percent, there are some blocks and municipalities like Ranaghat I & II, Nabadwip, Haringhataand Gayeshpur those lagged far behind.

Child health status in terms of low birth weight children and initiation of breast feeding within onehour of birth portrays a comfortable picture. Similarly, in terms of service delivery coverage of AWC, weighing at AWC and taking child weight within 48 hours of birth stays at more than 90 percent level. Therefore, here also efforts need to make to maintain the share at their presentlevel. As per the present analysis Nadia is way forward in many of these indictors in comparison to West Bengal and other districts of West Bengal. But the challenges of Nadia lies in keep up itseffort to maintain the share at the present level.

#### Comprehensive National Nutrition Survey (CNNS) in Zone-I consisting of 7 States of India

Agency: UNICEF, India

The Comprehensive National Nutrition Survey (CNNS) aims to obtain information on micronutrient status, worm infestation, and the nutritional risk factors for NCDs such as physical fitness, blood pressure, glucose concentration and lipid profiles among three age-groups namely pre-school children (0-5) years, schoolage children (6-14) years and adolescents (15-19) years in India.

#### The objectives are:

- To design, develop, organize and conduct national nutrition survey among target groups of children as lead agency to coordinate the entire operation in India
- To identify and select regional agencies to conduct survey in the states in consultation with UNICEF and MOHFW India
- To design, develop and organize survey questionnaires, tools, checklists for sample collection and field manuals for CNNS
- To organize centralized TOT for lead trainers from regional agencies.
- To organize samples collection of the subjects and laboratory testing in coordination with the regional agencies and laboratory institution of India
- To coordinate, monitor and supervise the data collection of the CNNS.
- To develop the data entry software, table generation and analysis

The study estimated the nutrition status among the three age groups: pre-school children (0-5 years), school- age children (6-14 years), and adolescents (15-19 years) in 30 states of India.IIHMR University carried out the survey in 7 States, including Jammu & Kashmir, Himachal Pradesh, Haryana, Punjab, Delhi, Rajasthan and Gujarat.

#### Cost Benefit Analysis of Health System

**Agency:** Tata Education and Development Trust

#### Rajasthan: Health Scenario, Health System interventions and Cost-Benefit Studies

The India Consensus partnered with the State Government of Rajasthan to undertake cost-benefit studies of potential healthcare interventions which were identified and prioritized through a process of stakeholder consultations. The interventions are:

- i) Strengthening basic and surgical capacities to reduce maternal and neonatal deaths;
- ii) Improving emergency referral management using 108 ambulance services; and
- iii) Family planning interventions.

The study findings indicated that investment in these interventions would have benefit-cost ratios of 9.7, 8.8, 3.3 and 32 for improved maternal and neonatal care, improved emergency response in urban and rural areas and improved family planning respectively. These analyses revealed that investment in these interventions would improve allocative efficiency and help in strengthening public health services in the state.

#### Cost-benefit Analysis of Adolescent Health Interventions for Rajasthan

The total number of adolescents (10-19 years) in Rajasthan is 15.7 million (Census, 2011), which constitutes about 23 percent of the total state population, a potential demographic dividend for the economy. However, there are some key health issues associated with the adolescents that require immediate attention which can otherwise lead to immediate health problems, long term disorders, or poor health later in life and hinder their ability to grow and develop to their full potential. Among others, the key issues affecting the development of adolescents in India as well as Rajasthan include high rate of child marriage, high prevalence of anemia, especially among females and various problems related to mental health.

In this study, the team reviewed the current status and magnitude of these major problems and have also analyzed prospective interventions using cost benefit analysis to address the same in an efficient manner. The analysis revealed that interventions aimed at delaying child marriage through incentives in-kind, preventing anemia among adolescent girls through iron and folic acid supplementation and addressing mental health issues of adolescents in schools through universal screening and providing further treatment after case finding can yield higher benefit per unit of invested cost. The analysis was based on sound secondary evidence in terms of data and other findings and the robustness has been checked.

The study found that investment made on delaying child marriage via direct incentives, preventing anemia among adolescent girls, and School based behavioral screening and further mental health services for the adolescents have benefit-cost ratios of 3.4, 9.2, and 1.4 respectively at 5 percent discount rate.

#### Andhra Pradesh: Health Scenario, Health Systems Interventions and Cost-Benefit Studies

The India Consensus has partnered with the State Government to undertake Cost-Benefit studies of the interventions that had been identified and prioritized through stakeholder consultations. In the health sector, these are:

- i) Strengthening basic and surgical capacities for reducing maternal and neonatal deaths;
- ii) Improving emergency referral management using 108 ambulance services; and
- iii) Family planning interventions.

The study found that investment made on strengthening basic and surgical capacities for reducing maternal and neonatal deaths, improved emergency referral management using 108 ambulance services in urban and rural areas, and family planning interventions have benefit-cost ratios of 7.3, 16.8, 6.8, and 16 respectively. These analyses revealed that investment in these key health interventions is cost-effective and should help decision making for public health interventions that maximize dividends.

#### Cost-benefit Analysis of Adolescent Health Interventions for Andhra Pradesh

With about nine million adolescents among its total population of 49 million, Andhra Pradesh has one fifth of its total population in the age group of 10-19 years, offering a potential demographic dividend to the state's

economy. However, the full contribution of these adolescents can be utilized only if they are given the opportunity to develop their potential to the maximum possible extent. The unique health needs of this age group during their transition from childhood to adulthood are often neglected; this can have both immediate as well as long-term repercussions.

In this study, the team analyzed threekey issues affecting the development of adolescents in Andhra Pradesh – high rate of child marriage, widespread anemia among adolescent girls and mental health disorders. The authors had reviewed the status and magnitude of these problems and also analyzed prospective interventions for addressing these challenges using the cost-benefit analysis approach. The study found that interventions aimed at delaying child marriage through incentives in-kind, preventing anemia among adolescent girls through iron and folic acid supplementation, and protecting the mental health of all adolescents through screening and evidence-based care can yield higher benefit per unit of cost incurred. The analysis was based on sound secondary evidence in terms of data and other findings. The cost effectiveness will provide the rationale for policy makers to adopt these interventions to improve adolescent health in the state.

The study found that investment made on delaying child marriage via direct incentives, preventing anemia among adolescent girls, and School based behavioral screening and further mental health services for the adolescents have benefit-cost ratios of 3.0, 14.9, and 2.4 respectively at 5 percent discount rate.

# Formulation of evidence-based and actionable dietary advice for pregnant and lactating women in Bhilwara, Rajasthan

Agency: IPE Global Limited

Indian women are at an increased risk of undernutrition whilst pregnant and lactating. Nearly 27 percent of the women in Rajasthan are undernourished and nearly half (47 percent) of the pregnant women were anemic (IIPS, 2016). This study's aim was to collect data on local dietary patterns, availability of food, the cost of locally available foods in local markets etc. This project provides actionable dietary recommendations for pregnant and lactating women in Rajasthan to address dietary gap at a minimum cost.

The objectives of the study were (i). to determine what pregnant women eat during these periods and other details of eating habits-occasions, size of different meals etc, How is this different from their usual diet (when not pregnant or lactating), (ii). Identify gaps in their diets compared to the recommendations offered by WHO and Indian Council of Medical Research (ICMR), (iii). Identify realistic and specific dietary advice/recommendations to address nutrients gaps using locally available foods and food products that are acceptable and affordable.

The study was conducted in Bhilwara district of Rajasthan. Multistage proportionate techniques were used for collecting data. Structured open-ended 24 hours recall questionnaire was used to collect data from 720 respondents from 30 Primary Sampling Units (PSUs) across five blocks of the district.

Analysis revealed that, 84 different food items consumed by the target groups, of which 35 were the source for one or more nutrient only. Final dietary pattern data indicated inadequate dietary intake, especially hunger pangs during pregnancy and lactation period among women.

The study recommended the strong IEC and community participation measures by the state government involving the national level NGOs and development partners and supporting P&LW by cash incentive of at least INR 37 per day for pregnant women and INR 35 for lactating women, which will ensure pregnant and lactating women have the means to access a more diverse and balanced diet to meet RDA recommendation.

# Pre and Post Assessment of Knowledge and Practice on WASH in Flood affected district of Malda in West Bengal

Agency: Save the Children, Bal Raksha, Bharat

The study on Pre and Post Assessment of Knowledge and Practices on WASH explored the knowledge, practice and awareness related to water, sanitation and hygiene in Habibpur and Bamongla- two flood affected blocks of Malda, West Bengal. The study explored the WASH behavior at household and institutional level, where at institutions level it covers schools and Anganwadi Centers. At household level study explored the WASH practice knowledge and accessibility for the women head in the households, adolescent girls and adolescent boys. For women and girls it also examined the menstrual practice and knowledge.

The post assessment reported increase in usages of latrine with septic tank and decrease in usage of neighbors' toilet for sanitation purposes, this implied that more households now have their own toilets. Situation of solid and liquid waste management represents a poor picture where the villages hardly have any drainage systems for disposing liquid waste. Solid wastes are disposed off mostly in household backyard and there is no system of community garbage pit or its collection or disposing off. Block administration expressed their willingness to develop community dumping ground in future, but it is yet to show its results. Both in pre and post assessment hand washing behavior showed uniform pattern. Hand washing with plain water is the most common practice whereas washing with water and soap can mostly be seen only post defecation, post cleaning child after he/she defecates and post cleaning menstrual waste. It is even absent before feeding the child or after handling raw food materials.

Menstruation practice reported a mixed picture where most of the women are still using cloths. Girls prefer to stay out of school during their menstruation days following problem of changing the soaking materials at school. Both these group however report the poor quality of local made sanitary napkins. Restriction in participation in religious function is the most common restriction both for women and girls. Regarding disposing the menstrual waste, they again have poor habit of putting it inside a pit or throwing it in a pond which is no more in use. Regarding food hygiene, although almost all of them are keeping the cooked food in a covered container, only one third of them are washing hand before touching the same. At schools tube well remain the main source of drinking water and for AWC it is similar source used by the owner and it is submersible.

In terms of knowledge, pre and post assessment did not see much change in knowledge level given the paucity of time. Diarrhea remains the most commonly reported disease due to unsafe water. They have fair knowledge on source of safe water but knowledge on water contamination was not clear. Though all of them heard about the vector borne diseases its linkages with poor solid and liquid waste management behavior is not clear to them. However, they do agree that diseases like dengue, chikungunya are now a day common in rural areas too. Knowledge on disease caused by open defecation and poor hand wash is

again limited to diarrhea only. But how repeated suffering from the same can lead to chronic malnutrition for a child is not clear to the mother or adolescents. Their knowledge of illness caused by poor menstrual hygiene is near absent. Compared to respondents from household level, respondents from schools and AWCs have better knowledge. Regarding sources of knowledge on seven main issues including reproductive and child health the responses remain in between two television and health worker.

# Secondary Research on Partially Hydrogenated Vanaspati Oil (PVHO) Industry and theirCompliance with the Tans-fat regulations in India

Agency: Consumer Unity & Trust Society (CUTS)

The study was undertaken by IIHMR University on behest of Consumer Unity and Trust Society (CUTS) and Resolve to Save Lives (RTSL) with an aim to undertake a situation analysis of Partially Hydrogenated Vanaspati Oil (PHVO) market in India, its market size, consumption pattern, market players, market practices and regulation related to TFA compliances and practices. The study primarily utilized secondary data on different web data bases and was substantiated with limited field data collected through key informant interviews.

#### Assessing and Managing Mental Health Problems through frontline health workers: A Pilot study

Agency: Indian Council of Medical Research (ICMR)

The Mental Health Policy, Government of India (2014) explicitly highlighted integration of mental health within the existing primary health care system, skill upgradation of ANMs, to increase trained mental health personnel, and need for implementation research. The study aimed at assessing the change in identifying, detecting and managing mental health problems with frontline health functionaries in implementation and comparison areas. The following were the objectives of the study were to: (i) To build capacity of frontline health workers' knowledge and skills in assessing mental health problems; (ii) To apply use of the Global Mental Health Assessment Tool by frontline health workers in routine mental health care in Indian context; and (iii) To create an enabling environment for health seeking for mental health issues among rural community.

The study was implemented in Alwar district. With the permission of Director Public Health (Directorate of Medical and Health, Government of Rajasthan) and Chief Medical and Health Officer, Alwar the study blocks selectedwere: Rajgarh – Intervention block (two primary health centers- Rajpur Bada and Gola ka Bas, which are model PHCs); and Malakheda – Non-intervention Block (Baleta and Chandoli)

The frontline health workers did not expose to training on mental health issues before the project and even by the time of completion of the study in the non-intervention areas. Under the study, 16 frontline health workers were trained on mental health including using GMHAT. The frontline health workers conducted a total of 918 interviews using GMHAT. Of these, 84 (9%) were diagnosed by one or another mental illness, and 72 (8%) were validated by the Experts (Psychiatrists). Knowledge of mental health disorders before and after among people increased by six percentage points in the intervention areas as compared to no change in the non-intervention areas from pre-test to post-test results.

In the era of digital technology GMHAT could be an integral part of health care delivery systems and experts may guide and mentor the frontline health workers in assessing and managing the psychiatric patients.

#### Developing Baseline for "Chirali" Scheme (Community Action Groups)

Agency: The Center for Community Economics and Development Consultants Society

(CECOEDECON)

Using qualitative approach, the research project attempted to collect baseline information on violence against women in select 7 districts of Rajasthan. The objectives of the study were to assess the awareness and knowledge of the core group members of the chirali group on gender, gender-based discrimination and gender-based violence, to understand the awareness and knowledge of the group members on gender-based legislations and measures for preventing violence against women, to gather perception of the stakeholders on the status of environment with respect to women safety in villages and panchayats, to examine perceived male involvement in ensuring gender equality, to collect information on the institutional reporting of violence against women and girls in the chirali districts, to assess the knowledge of the core group members on available redressal mechanisms for the violence affected women and to develop insights on extent of convergence between various programs designed to end violence and gender-based discrimination and implementation of gender legislation/ acts.

It was found that violence towards women was understood more in terms of violence from outside world. Violence at home, particularly domestic violence was considered as an accepted phenomenon among couples. Though encouragingly, even this violence was not supported but was viewed as a family affair and community preferred not to intervene. The villages visited were otherwise reported as safe for women. Male involvement was understood more with respect to counselling when the violence has occurred but less regarding their role in prevention of violence. Knowledge about the laws was lacking among the community, the awareness was limited to knowing the name and that too more for the laws like child marriages, dowry and PCPNDT. Knowledge about the Chirali scheme was almost nil both among the community and other stakeholders except among the front line workers who had received orientation on it. There was no knowledge of the mechanisms and systems to approach in case of violence, the only external platform reported was that of Police in extreme cases. Of the three departments, Women Empowerment (WE), Police and Judiciary who are the main stakeholders in the scheme, only officials of WE were aware of Chirali, other departments had not even heard of it. The three departments were functioning as independent bodies even for awareness generation among the community but had no convergence on the issue of violence under Chirali.

#### **ACADEMICS**

The IIHMR University has been the pioneer institution of higher learning which developed a new discipline of health management in the country. Initially it was engaged only in health research and capacity building of the human resource involved in the management and implementation of the health care programmes. The first academic programme with the title "Postgraduate Diploma in Hospital and Health Management" was launched by the IIHMR in the year 1996. Within a short span of 3-4 years, the programme became an acclaimed management course. In last about two decades the alumni of the IIHMR have been instrumental in efficiently managing the healthcare institutions throughout the country and overseas.

#### MBA Rural Management

Recognized Bachelor's Degree of minimum 3 Years duration with at least 50% (45% for SC, ST and OBC candidates) marks in aggregate in any discipline with valid score of management aptitude tests or relevant work experience. Candidates with relevant experience in rural management/development sector are encouraged to apply.

#### PhD

Recognized Masters' Degree or Post Graduate Diploma in Management (PGDM) from a UGC/AICTE recognized institution or University, with at least 55% marks or 50% marks for SC/ST/OBC candidates (or equivalent grade) in Hospital and Health Management, General Management, Medicine, Nursing, Pharmacy, Health Informatics, Social and Behavioral Sciences, Economics, Commerce, Science, Demography and Statistics. Faculty and working professionals with relevant qualifications and experience are encouraged to join the programme. #### **Academic Session Plan**

The student feedback is also considered while finalizing the session plan. The Plan is submitted to the Academic Council of the University for approval before commencement of the academic session. #### **TRAINING**

The IIHMR University, Jaipur is a leading University in the country for skill development to improve the management practices in health sector. The training and capacity building efforts of the university benefited huge number of policy makers, advisors, hospital managers, health managers, planners, decision-makers, and pharmaceutical professionals at national and international levels to improve the leadership and management skills.

# **Management Development Programs (MDPs)**

MDPs Conducted during April 2018- March 2019

• Leadership and Strategic Management in Healthcare for Senior Management Executive at Goa: The four-day high value program was held during September 25-28, 2018 at Goa, India. The objective of the program was to strengthen leadership and managerial competencies of senior management professionals. It was designed to transform senior management executives into high performing leaders who can capitalize on existing opportunities and organizational strength for improved management. In all, there were 13 participants from four counties, namely Ethiopia, India, Timor-Leste and Lao PDR. The Indian participants were from four States namely Bihar, Delhi, Gujarat, Uttar Pradesh. The participants were from Government, and Non-Governmental agencies. The program was coordinated by Dr. P. R. Sodani, Dean Training, IIHMR University, Jaipur.

- Operation Management in Hospitals: The three-day Management Development Program during November 16-18, 2018. The general objective of the program was to make hospital & health managers. Specific objectives of the Program were, to evaluate hospital projects with PERT/CPM techniques, to understand forecasting techniques in health care operations, to help participants understand the inventory control techniques, to understand the quality management and quality control techniques in hospitals, to help participants understand queuing model formulations in hospital services, to train the participants on decision sciences software for solving the OM problems. In all there were 15 participants from two countries India and Nepal respectively. The participants were from Government, and Non-Governmental agencies. The Program was coordinated by Dr. Susmit Jain, Assistant Professor, IIHMR University, Jaipur.
- Planning and Managing Social and Behavior Change Communication (SBCC) Interventions in Health Sector: The five-day program was held during December 17-21, 2018 at IIHMR University, Jaipur. The objectives of the training program were to provide clarity on the basic concepts of information, education, and communication (IEC) and social behavior change communication (SBCC), assess communication needs and evolve program - based interventions, plan and implement a SBCC Program. In all there were 10 participants in the program from Heath Education Department of Central Tibetan Administration and National Health Mission, Gujarat, India. Fast speed internet access is available with the help of dedicated (1:1) Lease line. Internet facility is made available to the staff, student and training participants for external communication and for global exposure to research and training. Use of internet is closely monitored by a powerful Unified Threat Management appliance fulfilling the norms of Ministry of Communication and IT (DoT, GoI).

IIHMR University has implemented ERP in all its internal processes by collaborating with Serosoft. A competent team of individuals from the IT Department, with the help of other major departments in the university, has successfully implemented the ERP in several phases. # **Grievance Redressal Committee**

- Demand of money in excess of that specified in the declared admission policy or approved by the competent authority to be charged by such institution.
- Breach of the policy for reservation in admission as may be applicable.
- Complaints of alleged discrimination by students from Scheduled Caste, Scheduled Tribes, OBC, women, minority or disabled categories.
- Non-payment or delay in payment of scholarships to any students that such institution is committed.
- Delay in conduct of examinations or declaration of results beyond that specified in the academic calendar.

- On provision of student amenities as may have been promised or required to be provided by the institution.
- Denial of quality education as promised at the time of admission orrequired to be provided.
- · Non-transparent or unfair evaluation practices.
- Harassment and victimization of students including sexual harassment.
- Refund of fees on withdrawal of admissions as per university norms.

# 1. Workshop on Bio-Medical Waste Management Rules-2016

One day Training cum workshop on Bio-Medical Waste Management Rules-2016 was organized at Mahatma Gandhi Hospital, IMA auditorium Bhilwara on 24° Sept. 2018 and Kundal Leela Resorts, Chittorgarh on 25° Sept. 2018.

The sponsoring body of the workshop was Rajasthan State Pollution Control Board (RSPCB), Jaipur. Total 208 participants (105 at Bhilwara and 103 at Chittorgarh) were present in the workshop.

# 2. Training Workshop on Health Management Ethics for Protection of Human Participants

The training cum workshop on ethics was conducted during September 27-29, 2018 with the support of ICMR, new Delhi. An ethical practice in health service delivery practice and management is extremely important but not a privilege because of involving human participants. Working with human participants can also pose ethical dilemmas and regulatory challenges prior to, during and post practices, treatment and research. The training workshops aimed at enhancing ability to develop and review health research from ethical perspectives/ lens; and clarifying areas which are not clearly defined: The specific objectives were:

- a. To recognize the various concepts of ethical issues in health research
- b. To apprise the existing and revised guidelines for ethics in health research; and
- c. To identify and use the ethical principles for decision making

# 3. CME on Hemovigilance Program of India Supported by National Institute of Biologicals, Ministry of Health & Family Welfare

The IIHMR University, Jaipur conducted a CME on Haemovigilance Program of India in collaboration with National Institute of Biologicals (NIB), Ministry of Health and Family Welfare, Government of India on 22 Oct 2018. Safety of patient is crucial to Universal Healthcare Access and seamless healthcare service delivery. CME covered user's perspective, a software demonstration as well as recognition of acute transfusion reactions by bedside staff, reporting & investigation and standard action plan to be followed. The agenda fits in smoothly with the Government's National Patient Safety Implementation Framework and also furthers the World Health Organization's push to implement national haemovigilance systems.

All the stakeholders involved in the process, from the hospital clinic staff and transfusion laboratories, in-house transfusion committees, regulatory agencies and national health authorities are thus made more involved in monitoring, identification, reporting, investigation and analysis of unfavorable eventualities and prevent their occurrence.

# 4. Swasth Bharat Yatra

Food Safety and Standards Authority of India (FSSAI), Govt. of India launched the "Swasth Bharat Yatra" an Eat Right India movement to create awareness on food safety and healthy diets in a holistic manner, for food safety and healthy diets are essential for elimination of food related diseases such as malnutrition, micronutrient deficiencies and growing incidence of non-communicable diseases. Swasth Bharat Yatra (SBY), was a nationwide cycle rally that had 150 volunteer cyclists, who traveled across the nation in 100 days. The Cyclathon was launched on October 16, 2018 from six different locations in India and after covering all states/UTs, concluded at New Delhi on January 27, 2019.

The event commuted through Jaipur from December 28, 2018 to January 3, 2019. The Technical Support Unit (TSU) for Food Fortification at IIHMR, Jaipur facilitated the agenda of food fortification and was associated with Department of Food Safety, Rajasthan and other state departments to make the rally successful and create more awareness amongst people about enriched and safe food.

# 5. Annual Conference-Pradanya

The Annual Conference – Pradanya 2018 was held at the IIHMR University from 29th Nov - 1st Dec 2018. The Conference had a very innovative and central theme "Reimaging healthcare yesterday's dream tomorrow's reality". The event had 5 technical sessions, 24 keynote speakers, 16 paper presentation and 32 posters presentations on different sub themes. These themes were:

- Ayushman Bharat: Key to universalization of healthcare
- India's Journey: Attaining SDG's in rural development
- Drugs and Vaccines Discovery: Is India ready to change in disease burden
- Patient Centric Approach: Safe hospital culture into practice
- Advancement in Healthcare Technology: The new wave

The speakers of each session presented their papers in a very interactive manner which kept the delegates interest alive throughout the session. Presentation was well defined covering all aspects of topics highlighting the prevailing conditions in India and suggested measures for further improvements. Every presentation in each session was major healthcare topic and presented innovative ideas for making improvements in the system. Delegates of the conference explored the opportunities and challenges in implementing Ayushman Bharat, achieving sustainable development goals and role of technology in healthcare delivery. Conference program is spread over three days, the summary of recommendations based on the presentations has also been made part of the report.

The conference concluded with the solutions and improvements to the complex challenges of healthcare sector. IIHMR-U will continue to provide such platforms to all the stakeholders for analyzing the relevant issues to address the healthcare challenges in the light of technological developments. The conference was attended by over 600 delegates, executives and management officials from private and government healthcare and social/development sector, academicians, including healthcare researchers, students of hospital and health management and related fields from all over the country.

# 6. Skill Development for Diagnosis and Management of Mental Illness using Digital Technology

An International Scientific Training on 'Skill Development for Diagnosis and Management of Mental Illness using Digital Technology' was jointly organized by World Psychiatric Association (Rural Mental Health Section), University of Chester, South Asia Self Harm Research Capacity Building Initiative (SASHI), Indian Council of Medical Research (ICMR), Indian Psychiatric Society, and IIHMR University from February 7 to 9, 2019 at Jaipur, India. The three-day program included a two-day training on Global Mental Health Assessment tool (GMHAT) and the third and last day was held in conference mode. The program was successfully able to achieve its three-fold objective of describing mental illness (prevalence, categories, causes, symptoms and impact) from a public health perspective; explaining challenges in providing mental health services, preventing suicides; and developing clinical skills to assess mental illness using GMHAT/PC.

# 7. National Symposium on Industry-Academia Interaction

A National symposium on Industry-Academia interaction 'Future of Pharmaceutical Industry vis a vis Pharmacy Education in India' was organized at Hotel Swagath Grand, Hyderabad on March 6, 2019. The symposium was organized under joint collaboration between The IIHMR University, Jaipur and the Association of Pharmacy Professionals (APP), Telangana State Branch. Over 180 students participated in the conference. The program started at 9.30 am with the lighting of the lamp and a welcome address by Dr. S.D. Gupta, Chairman, IIHMRU and Dr. Pankaj Gupta, President, IIHMRU. A message by Dr. Rajiv Dahiya, President, APP, to the students, was read by Dr. Muralidhar Rao, Principal St. Mary's COP. Dr. G. Tulja Rani, Principal, Malla Reddy COPalso addressed the students.

# 8. International Conference on Global Health and Medical Tourism in association with IIM Kozhikode

IIHMR University collaborated with IIM Kozhikode to organize an International Conference on Global Health and Medical Tourism from March 7-13, 2019. Bringing medical practitioners and experts from the field of healthcare, pharmaceutical and allied industries, the conference delved into various aspects of medical tourism. The IIHMR University held the inaugural event on March 12, 2019, thus commencing the second phase of the GloHMT Conference. The first phase of the event was held in IIM Kozhikode from March 7-10, 2019.

Attendees gained a clear landscape of technology, policies, global healthcare perspectives, healthcare models and best practices in medical tourism through plenary sessions, panel discussions, and paper presentations that have taken place since March 7, 2019 until March 13, 2019. Several dignitaries such as IAS officers in Rajasthan as well as spiritual gurus and seekers, including doctors and health experts from around Rajasthan. India's prominence in medical tourism was gleaned upon, with a closer look towards the cause of spiritualism influencing travelers and practitioners.

# 9. Distinguished Academic Leadership Program

On behalf of Faculty Development, Research and Publications Committee, the IIHMR University organized the first Distinguished Academic Leadership Series program from October 25 to 26, 2018. The University invited three distinguished academic leaders Prof. KrishLadha, Prof. Rani Ladha and Prof. SubhashisGangopadhyay for the event. Academic lectures and research talks were the norm during the two days, where the speakers addressed students and faculty through FDPs and general discussions. The two-day program was well attended by the faculty, research scholars and second year students of all the streams.

# **Centres of Excellence**

IIHMR University has been engaged in policy issues, planning and management, research and capacity building mainly in the health sector for over three decades. It has defined health management education and has substantially contributed in research and training. Its education, research and training programs, it focused more on health and hospital management, population and reproductive health and evaluation, health economics and finance, human resource, pharmaceutical management, rural management and primary health care. In the light of its rich experience in health sector, and in response to felt need for commencing focused studies on various thrust areas, the IIHMR University has established dedicated Centers at the University.

# Centre for Injury Research (CIR)

Globally, Injuries are emerging as one of the leading causes of loss of lives and physical infirmities constituting over 20 percent of human deaths and disabilities occurring each year. In India Injuries are responsible for about 12% of deaths and disabilities in a year. Rapid economic development resulting in urbanization, industrialization and climate change significantly led to steep rise in injuries caused by accidents, natural calamities, communal and familial violence. In early years, the term Injury was synonym to injury from vehicular accidents but now the scope of injury is quite inclusive. It is being considered as an important public health issue to be addressed on priority.

India has registered an alarming increase in hospitalization of injury inflicted patients. As the occurrences of sustaining injuries to human lives are sudden, random, and uncontrollable, there has been less attention to evaluate the causes, intensity, magnitude and consequences of injuries. This has been noticed that scientific knowledge and analysis possibly helps a great deal in permeating awareness about the potential injuries which can prevent and control the injury occurrences. If systematic research is conducted on various aspects, and nature of injuries appropriate remedial measures can be taken well in time. Keeping this fact in mind, a Centre for Injury Research (CIR) has been established in IIHMR University in collaboration with Johns Hopkins International Injury Research Unit at Bloomberg School of Public Health, JHU, and Baltimore, USA, with the mandate to:

- Redefine injury as an urgent public health issue and to promote it as a scientific discipline through quality research, education, and advocacy
- Conduct studies and implement projects relating to injuries, their identification, understanding, patterns, risk factors, prevention opportunities, treatment options etc.
- Collaborate with the governments, nongovernmental and business organizations, and stakeholders to document the incidence and impact of injury, understand its causes, identify effective interventions, and promote dissemination of information and policies.
- Build capacity of researchers, health professionals, policy makers, stakeholders and field officers/ staff involved in injury control and prevention.

- Influence Government policies, systems and legislations for effective prevention and control of injuries through evidence-based research and dissemination of information.
- Spread awareness and facilitate dialogue among public health practitioners, policy makers, researchers, and the general public about the importance of injury prevention and research

The Center is striving to bring synergy and convergence through coordination in various disciplines, organizations and arms of the Government like epidemiology and biostatistics; social and behavioral sciences; law and criminal justice; police and transport; disaster relief, engineering and design; health services research; health and public policy; health education and communication; economics; and nursing and medicine.

Following are the activities being conducted during the year 2018-19:

- Helmet and Seatbelt use in Rajasthan: Observed usage rates and Knowledge, Attitudes and Practices
- 2. Study on Burn Injuries in Rajasthan
- 3. Integrated Road Traffic Injuries Surveillance India Project (IRIS-India)

## Training and Capacity Building

A Training session was conducted for the students of MBA (Health, Hospital, Rural and Pharma) of IIHMR University on preparing IEC materials for awareness generation regarding road safety during February 2016. The training was facilitated by Dr. Alok Mathur, Associate Professor, IIHMR University and around 120 students participated in the program. The students were not only sensitized on road safety issues, but also acquired skills for developing material on the issue at the community level

# Centre for Health Systems and Policy Research (CHSPR)

The Center for Health Systems and Policy Research (CHSPR) aims to bring together two key domains of 'health policy' and 'health systems' which have hitherto tended to operate in silos. In broad terms, the research carried out at the center seeks to generate new knowledge on how different actors engage and interact in different socio-political milieus to contribute to health policy processes, and how that relates to the public and community health outcomes. The CHSPR is engaged in cutting-edge research and policy advocacy on a wide range of issues pertaining to health systems across the South and South-East Asia Region. These include issues such as politics and policies on health financing, health system management and governance and so on.

More specific objectives of the CHSPR are:

- Undertake health policy and systems research in the countries of South East Asian Region
- Develop a critical mass of competent researchers in the field of health, hospital and other related areas
- Generate knowledge and disseminate evidence on effectiveness of health policy &programme interventions and components of health systems, and inform the public policies on health

IIHMR University has a long-standing collaboration with Bloomberg School of Public Health of John Hopkins University, World Health Organization and several United Nations agencies. The CHSPR is open to partnership with other leading institutes.

# **Centre for Gender Studies (CGS)**

The Center for Gender Studies (CGS) is an interdisciplinary forum for the study of genderist role, health, status, and functions in the society. The aim of the Centre is to undertake academic programs, studies, research and capacity building activities related to gender. The Centre will promote awareness of its relevance in historic, economic, political, social, and scientific contexts. The Centre is expected to offer disciplinary and interdisciplinary academic programs in Gender studies; provide technical and institutional support for gender mainstreaming in planning, impending, monitoring and evaluation of programs; generate evidence based quality research on various aspects of gender which can influence policy formulation, budgetary allocations, public opinion and awareness; to work as a vibrant forum for building capacities of persons who are involved in implementation and formulations of the policies/programs related to gender and equality. It will help the educators, policy makers as well as other key stakeholders in gender-transformative planning and designing service delivery system; organize lectures, seminars, workshops and film screenings on a wide range of subjects related to gender and equality; promote community engagement; document and disseminate the perspectives and experience of studies and research conducted under the Centre. The Centre will collaborate and network with national and international organizations for advancement of the activities of the Centre.

# **Centre for Health Economics (CHE)**

IIHMRU has been engaged in policy issues, planning and management, research, and capacity building mainly in the health sector for over three decades. It has defined health management research substantially and contributed in research and training and education. The programs are focused more specifically on health and hospital management, population and reproductive health and evaluation, health economics and finance, human resource, pharmaceutical management, rural management, and primary health care. In the light of IIHMR's rich experience in health sector and felt need for commencing focused studies on Health Economics, the IIHMR University has established a dedicated Centre for Health Economics (CHE). The mandates of the Centre for Health Economics are:

- To conduct quality research on a wide variety of topics including determinants of health and health inequalities; equities in health systems; health care financing, funding and insurance; the impact of health care, health insurance; preventive services on health lifestyles; delivery of health care models; health technology assessment; knowledge transfer; regulation, values and ethics in health policy; patient participation in clinical decisions; public and community engagement; providing evidence based advice to governments to enable a more effective and equitable allocation of resources. The Centre will help in developing and applying research methods for setting priorities in health care.
- To conduct studies to examine economic issues involved in use of drugs and treatments available for long suffering diseases like cancer, asthma, kidney, and heart diseases. The Centre will undertake impact studies on the effectiveness of public health campaigns, quality healthcare, accessibility, and cost effectiveness of treatments, waiting times, social inequalities in health care, hospital efficiency and the costs and benefits of surgical techniques and interventions.
- To make a significant contribution to the public debate, advocacy and evidence-based policy development in the Indian healthcare sector specifically on coverage, affordability, health insurance, resource allocation, health outlays and quality of the health services in public, voluntary and private sector. It will provide support in making high performing health systems.
- To play a significant role in the practice of periodical economic evaluation of health services.
- To develop and redefine the scope of Health Economics as a new academic program in the University. It will create necessary expertise; infrastructure and resources for education, research and training in Health Economics.
- To publish research findings to disseminate the knowledge gained through its activities and influence the policies and fund allocations in health care.
- To provide a good platform to design and offer High Value Training Programs for senior management professionals engaged in policy and implementation of the health care programs.
- To foster dialogue among healthcare economists, health policymakers, health care practitioners, and the public.

# Centre for Mindfulness, Wellness, and Ethics (CMWE)

The Centre for Mindfulness, Wellness, and Ethics (CMWE) is a forum that aims to combine the interdisciplinary approaches of spiritual and health sciences and undertake research in the cusp of both areas. The Centre is involved in various activities to promote mental and physical wellness, and conducts research, training, and academic courses. The broader mission of the Centre is to align with the mission of IIHMR University and play a key role in promoting overall health, reduce suffering, and enhance the joy in life by realizing one's true human potential.

Centre for Mindfulness, Wellness, and Ethics recognizes happiness and well-being as the new frontiers of health by encouraging the practice of mindfulness and compassion in everyday life.

# **Financial Systems**

The University is, financially, a self-reliant incorporated body. # **School wise Budgeting**

The University prepares its annual budget assuming each School as a separate and independent unit. The budget for the financial year 2019-20 has been prepared based on a participatory process involving Deans of the respective schools along with the faculty members, Registrar and Managers of the administrative verticals. Each administrative and academic vertical conducted detailed assessments of the enabling as well as mitigating factors that are likely to shape the coming financial year's budgetary projections. The result is the proposed budget.

The separate budgeting of the Schools has brought more accountability and awareness about the resource generation at the School level. This exercise will strengthen the self-sustaining character of the University.

# Financial Control and Audit

Finance and Accounts department of the University is very prompt and efficient in managing the finance of the University. The University has an approved Accounting and Financial Procedures and all activities and tasks of the Finance and Accounts Department are performed in accordance with the Accounting and Financial Procedures. M/S M L Sharma and Company, the Chartered Accountancy firm is the statutory auditors of the IIHMR University. The University also has a system of internal audit. M/s H S Darda & Co., Chartered Accountants are the internal auditors for the FY 2018-19. The auditors meticulously undertake the auditing processes. The audit is a perennial activity in the campus.

## **Zumba Night**



# **PD Agarwal Memorial Lecture**


#### Conclusion
